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### Decisions, Decisions

We are very fortunate to have a beautiful pool and spa to enjoy year-round. But pools and spas can be extremely dangerous for small children. Drowning is second only to car accidents as the cause of accidental deaths of children 1-14 years old. For every fatal drowning, eight other children require medical attention and may experience lifelong mental and/ or physical disabilities. State law actually requires that pool enclosures have self-



closing, self-latching gates specifically to protect small children.

Residents are routinely propping open the pool area gate, at times leaving the gate ajar even though no one is left in the pool area. Please make sure the pool gate is always securely latched behind you when entering or leaving the pool area.

Having done inspections following fatal drownings, and reviewed reports of numerous other serious accidents statewide as a health inspector in Santa Clara County, I can assure you none of us ever, ever wants to have a child drowning here at Marin Valley due to simple carelessness on our part.

# Management Update Letter to Residents

Park Management is in the process of grading **retaining** walls for replacement or repair. Do you have a deteriorated wall you would like us to view and determine if repair or replacement is necessary? Call or email me.

We are paying close attention to fire safety and **abatement** issues here in the Park. We are working on the shaded fuel break. Defensible space is 50-100 feet surrounding MVMCC.

**Tree assessment** is also in progress for pruning or removal of Park-owned trees.

Please keep all pets indoors unless on a leash out for a walk. Several cats are on report with the front desk as unattended and/or outside. Remember that the young quail are vulnerable to cats. And remember, your dog barks when unattended so please keep your dogs with you. Your neighbors will thank you for that.

**Water is precious** and we should conserve as much as possible. Please do not water your gardens between the hours of 8 am and 6 pm. Use water incrementally at night or very early in the morning. This gives your plants a chance to absorb as much as possible. If you need help with setting your timer for your sprinkler system, please contact the front desk. We will set your timer.

Continue with all of your efforts to remove stored items from your carports. Still, many residents have items not permitted in a carport.

Per Rule 10.1, please do not hang laundry in **your yard to dry.** Your neighbors don't appreciate this.

Greetings from the Park Acquisition Corporation Board.

Our finances are in order. Our cash, plus mediumand long-term reserves, remains close to \$5.5 million. The MVMCC operating and capital budgets will be reviewed and possibly amended and approved this month by the Novato City Council. No rent increase is anticipated. MVMCC management, the PAC board, and the Public Works Department of the City of Novato are planning for capital improvements for the Park. We'll keep you updated.

Omicron variants continue to be a concern, and caution is still advised.

The water reservoirs in Marin are full but are being drawn down due to the hot weather and lack of rain. The drought currently ongoing in California is likely to continue, and the North Marin Water District is warning us to be mindful of our water usage.

# Stay Alert for a Few Summertime Hazards

Summer is here, following a beautiful 2022 spring. To help make your summer equally or even more beautiful, it's worth considering a few summertime hazards to which we all may be exposed.

**Covid Pandemic** — Unfortunately nothing new here, just a reminder that it's still with us and we are among the most vulnerable demographic.

### **MVEST Recommends**

- Don't go anywhere without a mask
- If you need to go indoors, remember to keep your distance and
- Limit your potential exposure times to strangers
- Pay attention to ventilation.

**Red Flag Days** — The local wildland fuel is already exceptionally dry thanks to our perennial drought. Add a dry easterly breeze on a warm day, and we have the recipe for a Red Flag Day, an extreme wildfire risk projection by the Weather Bureau.

### **MVEST Recommends**

Red Flag Days are not hazards in themselves, but rather times to be on highest alert for the next summertime hazard on our list. They are also a good time to do some fire mitigation and preparedness chores:

- Remove leaves away from your home (embers accumulate wherever leaves do.
- Make sure your car is fueled/charged and parked in your driveway facing the street.
- Review your evacuation checklist.
- Check that your contacts list is current.

**Wildfire** – and worse, a conflagration.

The majority of wildfires are routinely handled by our exceptionally talented local fire services, but on Red Flag Days ignitions can often get out of hand in mere seconds — well before the fire services have a chance to get an upper hand — and quickly grow to a conflagration that may last many days.

We have not seen one here in Marin, the likes of which neighboring Sonoma and Napa counties are far too familiar with, but we are far from immune. MVEST has identified wildfire as the greatest and most severe hazard threatening us at Marin Valley.

### **MVEST Recommends**

Review your homeowners' insurance — chances are you're underinsured.

Be prepared to grab your go-bag and evacuate at a moment's notice — day or night.

To help increase the chances for something to return to after an evacuation, stop *thinking* about our recommendations for hardening your home and making your yard defensible, and ACT! Put on your gloves and sunscreen and clean up the five-foot strip of ground abutting your house. Some of us have done a lot, but there's much more to go.

**Powerout** — At least one power failure is virtually inevitable here in summertime. Powerouts may last for a few minutes, a few hours, to a few days or more — bummer. They may be planned for maintenance, upgrades, or a PG&E Public Services Power Shutoff (PSPS); or unplanned, spontaneous incidents. And worse, they are usually followed shortly by communication failures — cell towers and internet providers — double bummer.

### **MVEST Recommends**

**Best** — Large, rechargeable batteries have become very common now, but very expensive, too. They're silent and easily recharged when the power returns or by solar panels. Larger units can power your fridge and lighting for a day or more.

**Good** — Less expensive but less convenient: gasoline, town gas, or propane fueled generators can do the job but can be deceptively complicated and noisy, hazardous, and undependable if not properly set up and maintained. Best to have a conversation with Park Management before pursuing this option.

**In a pinch** — You can make do with inexpensive and ubiquitous battery-powered flashlights and lanterns for lighting.

To keep your food safe, **dry ice** is the best bet. There are a few local sources, but best to call first — Oops, I forgot, your phone is probably out so you may need to go on an expedition. Try:

Also, when the power's out, the clubhouse will be open for you to charge your devices and get timely news about the outage.

**Smoke** – Associated with wildfires and conflagrations throughout the West, we have been known to be saddled with the worst air quality in the world – given a wildfire and atmospheric conditions.

### **MVEST Recommends**

Stay indoors as much as possible. N95 masks work in a pinch for brief outdoor exposures but they don't provide enough protection for extended outings. The best solutions include HEPA filters for home fan or HVAC (MERV-13), and for your car's cabin air filter. Our clubhouse HVAC systems are also HEPA filtered.

**High Heat** — We always look forward to the warmer days and nights of summer. But with global warming–induced heat waves and drought-induced low humidity, the heat can be deceptively troublesome for us seniors.

### **MVEST Recommends**

STAY HYDRATED, especially when the humidity is low;

- stay in the shade on very hot days
- visit the pool
- enjoy our air-conditioned clubhouse
- wear a dampened bandana
- chill your hands and feet (ice bath)
- limit your midday activities.

Also, MVEST set up a breezeway misting station for very hot days. (See next page.)

### Potential Electrical Problem

According to our electrician, Rick Kennedy, many of our homes were built in the early 70s and were outfitted with Zinsco electrical panels. The company who produced this product has been out of business for a number of years and for good reason. Their panels can cause house fires as they

did with Bill Crozier's home and almost ours! Another company with the same problem is FPE (Federal PacificElectric).

We came upon this potential problem when we purchased a new refrigerator. It was larger than our previous one, which required us to cut back the upper cabinet and move our microwave to another location. I called Rick's partner, John Purdue, and asked him to stop by to advise us as to where we could put the microwave.

When John went about checking which circuits operated the kitchen, he was unable to cut off the flow of electricity to our oven – a very dangerous situation and exactly what happened to Bill Crozier. John immediately sounded the alarm to Rick

Kennedy, who lives on Marin Valley Drive, and he came barreling down Sunrise to save the day!

A new panel the size of ours (Square D) costs about \$1,800–\$2,000 to replace. Our home is approximately 1,600 sq. ft. and was built in 1974. Was the new panel worth this expense? We decided it was, as there remain many years of life left to "this old house" as well as to Ed and me!

# It's Been a Year

Delanna "Dee" Justice Schneider died on July 3rd, 2021. We knew each other for 64 years and were married for almost 60 of those 64, so I thought I would reminisce a bit.

### **A Little History**

Dee grew up in a modest home on 74th Street in Los Angeles. Her father was district manager for Federal Mogul (automotive parts); her mother had the most important job of all: staying home, raising Delanna and her older brother (by four years).

Dee graduated from Washington High School, then on to the University of Southern California (USC), where we met, in a freshman speech class, in February 1958. We were married on February 3rd, 1962, in Madison, Connecticut, in an iconic white, high-steepled New England First Congregational church. For 59½ years we were always Mr. and Mrs. R&D.

Now for the reminiscences.

### **At Home**

Once our two incredible daughters, Carrie and Kathie, abandoned Mom and Dad (as all children do), Ray dispensed with Christmas trees. Dee was not happy with that, so she hung myriads of ornaments everywhere: on curtain rods, cabinet doorknobs, the chandelier, the front door, open space — everywhere.

She and a good friend, Jeannie Cohn, led paid hikes for 33 years: all over Marin, Sonoma County, and the North Bay; all over other places most people only read about: Belize, the Galapagos, Panama City,

Magdalena Bay, even Hawaii and Wisconsin. Delanna, an accomplished amateur ornithologist, knew the birds; Jeanne knew the plants and trees.



Dee taught four- and five-yearolds for over 34 years. Sometimes part-time, sometimes full. She retired from Strawberry Preschool four separate times, always getting a "we want you back" call. Her personality had the most amazing effect on everyone she met. She loved people — and they loved her — so much that she was always surrounded by incredibly good friends — always.

### In the Park

- Almost daily walks in Marin Valley, stopping to chat with all the great folks we inevitably met.
- She loved Pub: I'd walk her down the hill; Ed and Vickie would drive her back up the hill (home by 7).
- She loved the pool, especially water aerobics.
- Dee and Pauline tore out the juniper in front of the clubhouse, then planted most of what you now see.
- She was on the board of Mar Val.
- Dancing at the New Year's Eve party (and in-between whenever and wherever).
- And all the monthly dinners we never missed a one.
- Walking to and along the railroad tracks, even into St. Vincent's.
- Walking the hill behind our home to the water tower.
- Walking the ridge between Marin Valley and St. Vincent's.

- Watching Days of Our Lives with her while she ironed, when I was home sick.
- Birding with her and the other birders on the Frio River in the Texas hill country.

- Going to Wildcare animal rehabilitation center in San Rafael with her.
- Whale watching with her at Russ' and my wedding in Capitola

# American Robin

The American robin (*Turdus migratorius*) is a member of the thrush family, and it lives in our area year-round, with more prevalence during migration between its summer and winter ranges. The timing for these recent photos may appear a bit off for spring; Nancy and I were in southwestern Montana, where spring is ongoing.

We found this female American robin while camping at Norris Hot Springs, MT. She was obviously up to \*something\* as she fluffed herself up to maximum size and did some bold posturing.





When she came by with a mouthful of earthworms, it became obvious that she was on her way to feed her young.





Waiting quietly and patiently in the bushes was a single fledgling (apparently the last of the three-to-seven hatchlings that are typical for robin broods), who was \*very\* happy to get some food. The young are very well camouflaged, with white-tipped feathers that make them blend into the background.

The mouth is not so well camouflaged, being a bright yellow-orange, giving the parent a nice bright target for food.
